Types of AVO's

AVO means a apprehended violence order, which is an order that is created to protect those who are fearful of future violence and threats to their safety. there are two types of AVO's:

- ADVO Apprehended **Domestic Violence Order,** which is put in place when their concerns for safety are related to any domestic/intimate relationships
- APVO Apprehended Personal Violence Order, these are used when the parties have no relation to each other but have concerns for their safety

What happens if the order is breached

How long do these orders last?

The default time period of an AVO is now 2 years, if there is any need to make this a longer order than there will have to still be concerns for your safety when the order is about to end.

Conditions of AVO's

These orders are created by the court, if these orders are breached then the other party may be charged with a criminal offence.

It is important that you keep a copy of the AVO at all times and contact the police if you are concerned about your saftey and believe a breach has taken place.



Every AVO will have at least 3 conditions which aims to prohibit behavior's such as: assaulting, molesting, harassing, threatening, stalking, and it will protect anyone in a domestic relationship with the protected person. Extra orders can be placed such as: not allowing them to approach, go places and/or damage any property owned by the protected person.

*An AVO does not override a parenting plan as a parenting plan is a legally binding document and must be followed.
